**May 27-June 2, “The Holy Spirit”—Pastoral Notes**

Sabbath School Quarterly	Notes
Sunday: “No matter how important everything else about Jesus is, in the end, they all culminate in His substitutionary death in behalf of humanity.”	Romans 16:20 [after Christ’s substitutionary death]: “And the God of peace shall bruise Satan under your feet shortly” (compare with Genesis 3:15); Revelation 14:1. The great controversy culminates with Christ in the heart of the last generation
Sunday: “As Christians, the foundation of our hope, our acceptance with God, stems not from anything we can do, not from any works of righteousness we can produce, not even from any fruit of the Spirit but only to the righteousness of Jesus credited to us by faith.”	“Our only ground of hope is in the righteousness of Christ imputed to us, and in that wrought by His Spirit working in and through us” (Steps to Christ, p. 63).  “To whom God would make known what is the riches of the glory of this mystery among the Gentiles; which is Christ in you, the hope of glory” (Colossians 1:27).
Sunday: “...God’s grace—which is His unmerited favor toward us...”	“Men need to learn that the blessings of obedience, in their fullness, can be theirs only as they receive the grace of Christ. It is His grace that gives man power to obey the laws of God” (Ministry of Healing, p. 115).
Wednesday: “We are all, by nature, born in the flesh...”	We are born in a fallen human nature. We must become partakers of the divine nature in order to experience salvation (2 Peter 1:4). Friday: “...Why is it always crucial to remember that the basis of our salvation is what Christ has done for us?”	This is an incorrect assertion in the SSQ. Salvation includes Christ’s work for us <i>and</i> in us; they can hardly be separated.
